Discussion will include the history of regional planning in New Hampshire, the powers and duties of Regional Planning Commissions, the services Regional Planning Commissions provide to municipalities, and how those services may evolve in the future.

You've notified abutters, held the public hearing, heard hours of testimony, and now it's time to make a decision. What do you do? Do you need to decide right then and there? What if you only have four members present? Can there be conditions of approval? Do you vote on each of the criteria separately? Do you need to vote on anything at all? If these and other questions have plagued your ZBA, this session is for you.

Have you volunteered for your local land use board (planning, conservation, zoning) and realized you are not too confident on how to read or analyze engineering plans? Don't panic! This session will help you learn to do just that. You will review a variety of plan types including existing conditions, grading and drainage, road profiles, and landscape plans. During the first session, Sylvia will cover some of the basic terms and plan types, and then take you on a virtual tour to discuss site development elements on a variety of properties. In the second session, you will color actual engineering plans, learn a step-by-step process for highlighting plans, and then analyze plans as they "come alive" with color. By the end of the session you will have a good idea of how you can make plans more "readable," how to begin your analysis of plans, and how to use highlighted plans as a tool for discussion with developers.

Legal Update (double session)......PIERCEBenjamin D. Frost, Esq., AICP, NH Housing, Bedford, NH

This session will review recent New Hampshire Supreme Court decisions involving land use issues and the impact they have on municipal planning and zoning. Recently enacted legislation that affects the responsibilities and authority of municipal planning and zoning boards will also be discussed.

Come join our panel of experts in the public outreach and municipal economic development fields to learn how to enhance local business engagement and retention as a key economic development strategy for New Hampshire communities; as well as, learn about state and federal financial programs that can assist local communities to spur and encourage economic development. Discussions will include: ensuring that local businesses thrive and grow, creating a business retention effort that results in strong community engagement, and case studies of municipal economic development projects. The panel will share best practices for successfully engaging your local community around business and economic development issues and how to move forward with them.

This session will provide an overview of the issues surrounding short-term rentals, such as Airbnb and VRBO properties, as they relate to local land use boards. Discussion will also include recent legislative efforts as well as related litigation that may impact the short-term rental landscape. The session will conclude with time for Questions and Answers.

The 2020 Census will be happening in less than a year, and an accurate count of the population and its characteristics is important for a host of reasons. This session will look at the many ways that Census data can be used for land use planning, and discuss the work that is being done right now and in the coming months to ensure that next year's census completely counts who is living in our communities.

This session will provide a detailed look at the statutory responsibilities of the ZBA including appeals of administrative decisions, special exceptions, and variances. This session will also provide an in-depth discussion of how the case law interprets the five variance criteria. Time will be devoted to participant questions.

This session is for municipal planning officials and local land use board members who are interested in integrating energy reduction and renewable energy development into their municipal planning efforts. In this session you will hear from a large urban community that has integrated energy planning throughout their master plan and has become a municipal leader in greenhouse gas emission/nitrogen footprinting as well as a small rural community that has set a municipal 100% renewable energy goal and has developed a plan to implement the goal through zoning changes and renewable energy development.

Groundwater supplies 60 percent of NH's drinking water through public water systems and private wells. This session will provide an overview of what different municipalities have done on their own, or by working together, and what regional efforts are occurring to assist in protecting groundwater resources. Participants will also be introduced to the NH Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund (DWGTF), which is a relatively new funding source for drinking water systems in NH and has awarded over \$90M in grants and loans since 2017. This session will describe the role the fund can play in economic development in NH through supporting sustainable drinking water infrastructure.

Bike Paths, Recreational Trails, Multi-Use Paths, whichever name you wish to use, they are quickly becoming popular planning tools being used to link recreational trails with land use development to show the positive economic, recreational, residential, and health benefits the trails provide. Our speakers will discuss how to use modern technology to fit your communities needs as well as what environmental and wildlife considerations should be taken into account when siting and designing trails.
